

BLM-Alaska manages more surface and subsurface acres than any other state with BLM-managed lands. This includes approximately 72 million surface acres and 220 million subsurface acres (Federal mineral estate) in a state with a landmass equivalent to about one-sixth of the entire contiguous United States (see map on back). In FY2013, the BLM's management of public lands in the state had a total economic impact of more than \$314 million.

Oil and Gas (FY 2014)

Currently, oil and natural gas are on the only leasable minerals produced from Federal lands in Alaska.

National Petroleum Reserve in Alaska (NPR-A)

- The November 2014 lease sale resulted in 7 leases for 66,650 acres and generated \$658,978 in revenue. It was the 10th NPR-A oil and gas lease sale since 1999.
- 3 Applications for Permits to Drill approved, 2 wells drilled.

Cook Inlet in Southcentral Alaska

- Total acreage: 18,554.56 acres, six exploratory units
- Oil Production: 482,262 barrels up from 453,184 barrels in 2013
 - Natural Gas Production: 10,642,541 cubic feet Propane: 2,827 gallons (new product in 2014)
- Inspections completed: 62
- Producing leases: 29
- 5 Applications for Permit to Drill; 3 wells drilled

Oversight of Trans-Alaska Pipeline System

- Branch of Pipeline Monitoring
- 800 mile-long pipeline from Prudhoe Bay to Valdez
- 2014 average throughput 523,073 barrels per day

For over 40 years, BLM-Alaska has overseen the largest title transfer program in the Federal government involving the transfer of over 150 million acres of Federal lands.
